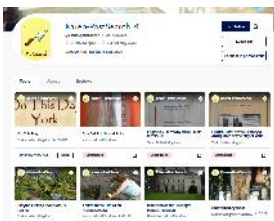
September Round Up

York: The Story of its Walls, Bars and Castles T P Cooper (1904)

The Yorkist Period (Part 1):

Henry was acknowledged king on the field of Bosworth immediately after the defeat and death of Richard. He mayor and citizens of York, feeling some anxiety lest the exemption of murage, and other privileges, granted by the vanquished monarch, should be withdrawn, and once petitioned Henry VII in their behalf. The letter, which is studiously phrased, is of historical importance, and records many stirring events of those turbulent times. It also refers to the injury the city had sustained by the frequent internecine struggles, so closely associated with its walls. This supplication mentions the civic benefits already enjoyed by the inhabitants in the following manner : - “first, that evere persone resorting unto the said citie shuld be toll free, wheby grete recourse shuld be had to the said citie, and so the sherffes, by reson therof, discharged for ever of £40 (=£33,470.00 in 2021) due yerely for the toll; also that the maier for the tyme being shuld be sargiant at armez, receiving of the fee ferme of the citie 12d (=£41.84 in 2021) by the day in his releve toward his charges of maraltie; also that the said fee ferme shuld be paid yerely unto the use of the citie toward the reparation of the walls, £20 (=£16,740.00 in 2021).”

In reply, the citizens were assured of Henry’s good grace, and the Corporation had no further cause for alarm.

We have no certain evidence that Richard’s grant, abolishing the payment of the fee-farm of *firma-burgi*, was rescinded by succeeding monarchs; from the two subsequent notices it would appear that it was not. The mayor and sheriffs were persistent in their petitions that that portion of the fee-farm, allotted for mural repairs, should not again be paid into the Exchequer. In writing (April 30, 1487) to the mayor, and his brother officers, Henry VII distinctly alludes to the question:-

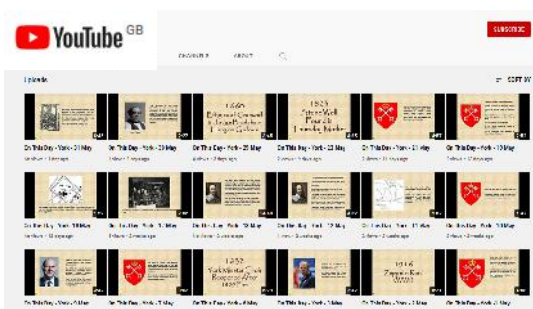
“As for the discharge in our Exchequer that ye desire to have there for certeyne oure fefermes of our said citie, We seeing well the true acquittail ye be of, with your good devours, diligence and hertines anempst us, be content so send and write that of the same fee ferme, ye shall have due allowance in all goodly hast as apperteyneth.”

In a letter, dated January 27, 1528, preserved at the Record Office, from the Corporation of York to Wolsey, thanks are given him for the pains he has often taken “for the preferment and maintaining of yor poor city of York, whereby we trust now that it shall be and continue a city”; and it is also asked that the corporation be allowed to conclude with Thomas Roos, Earl of Rutland, by writing of the certainty that they shall pay to him yearly from the fee-farm of the city.



Thomas Roos, Earl of Rutland: Or Thomas Manners, 1st Earl of Rutland, 12th Baron de Ros of Helmsley (c. 1497 – 20 September 1543), of Belvoir Castle, Rutland, was created Earl of Rutland by Henry VIII in 1525

1802 Ride of the Boundaries

It was a tradition for the Lord Mayor to ride the boundaries of York, although not the liberty of the city but the city's common land, which the citizens enjoyed rights of pasturage and thereby confirming those rights.

This traditions began in the medieval times and certainly continued into the 19th century.

One such ride took place on 2 and 3 October 1802, when William Hotham was Lord Mayor. The perambulation was split over two days.

On 2 October 1802 William Hotham and Commonalty rode the city boundaries on the east bank of the river Ouse.



They began at Bootham Bar then rode down to the River Ouse by Marygate following the river northwards until St. Mary's. They continued to the modern Wigginton Road.

They continued northwards for a distance into Bootham Stray to the modern A1237 and then turned to come back through New Earswick to Yearsley Bridge, now following the western side of the River Foss, crossing over at Monk Bridge and returning northward on the eastern side of the Foss, back up to Yearsley Bridge.

They then turned eastward following possible the rout of modern Muncastergate, back towards the city along Malton Road to the junction of Stockton Lane.

Here in 1802, they appear to have headed along Stockton Lane and out to Stockton on Forest. However, it is unclear how they returned back to the normal route. They probably simply returned back down Stockton Lane.

They now rode through Heworth, and along Tang Hall Lane to Hull Road, then made their way back towards the city along Hull Road and turned southwards at Green Dyke Lane.

They continued for a short distance but in 1802, they did not follow the normal route and ride around the whole of Walmgate Stray.

Instead they went around Fulford Open Fields along Heslington Road and back to the River Ouse, just south of where it joins with the Foss.

The following day, on 3 October, the Lord Mayor and Commonalty rode the city boundaries on the West bank of the river Ouse.



They began at Baile Hill and followed the Ouse southwards until just north of Middlethorpe and then went westward to Tadcaster Road.

They followed Tadcaster Road for a short distance, heading towards the city, turning possibly along St. Helen's Road.

They then made their way around Hob Moor to York Road in Acomb, now turning towards the city again. They then turn northwards around Holgate and headed back towards the River Ouse, finishing at Water End.

Archbishops of York – Eanbald II & Wulfsige



Born: ?
Died: c.808
Appointed: c.796
Term Ended: c.808

It is not known when Eanbald was born, however it is known that he was taught by Alcuin in York, who gave him the affectionate nickname "Simeon".

He was consecrated the successor of his namesake, Eanbald I, as Archbishopric of York on 14 August 796.

In c.782 Alcuin was invited by Charlemagne to become master of his palace school in Aachen. Alcuin kept in touch with Eanbald II, frequently writing letters, laying down many rules for the direction of his province. Alcuin also sent many gifts to York, including a shipload of metal from Aachen for the roof of the bell tower of York Minster.

In 798 Eanbald II assembled his clergy in synod at Finchale, near Durham. There, he enacted a number of regulations relating to the ecclesiastical courts and the observance of Easter. He may have been the first to introduce the Roman Ritual in the church of York.

It is also uncertain when Eanbald II died, most suggest c.808. However, like later Archbishops of York, Eanbald II produced coins in his own name, and these were continued through to 830. Is this evidence that he lived till this time or simply that his coins still in production when his successor Wulfsige became Archbishop, as there is some uncertainty of the start and end of his term.

In fact very little is known about Wulfsige. It does seem to be agreed that he was Eanbald II's successor but that seems to have been recorded is simply that he became Archbishop of York sometime after 808 and that he died between 830 to 837.
