October Round Up

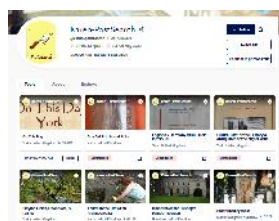

York: The Story of its Walls, Bars and Castles T P Cooper (1904)

The Yorkist Period (Part 2):

In the early part of the year 1487, in insurrectionary movement in favour of the imposter, Lambert Symnell, caused the municipal authorities of York some alarm. The City Archived contain several documents of considerable interest which throw much light on the rebellion, particularly showing how Symnell's advisers and supporters were unfavourably received by the people of Yorkshire and its capital.

The Lord Mayor, loyal to a degree, being uneasy under the apprehension of impending danger, addressed the subjoined letter to the King, wherein his lordship specially alludes to the weak state of the city defences:

"To moost highe and mighty christen prince and oure moost redoubtid souverain liege lord, We in oure moost humble wise recomendes us unto youre moost royall majesty, besuchinge almighty god to send your grace good and prosperoux life with abbonndaunces of perseveraunt fortunes. Pleasit the same to be acertayned we er and evermore shal be your true and faithful subgiettes redye tobbey woith oure bodis and godes any your high comaundementes aswell for the safeguard of your moost royall persone as this youre realme and in especiall in sure preserving of this youre citie unto your grace singularly ayenst all other entending the contrary. Albeit, sovererain lord, youre said citie is soo greteley decayed aswell by fallying down of the walls of the same and by taking downe of your Castell there by King Richard and as yet not reedified as other in diverse wise that without the same bee more largely manned may ne cannot wel be kept ayenst youre ennymes and rebelles if they shuld as God defend approche and move were aiyenst the same: And also how your said citie is not inhabit by the whiche ther is not half the nombre of good men within your said citie as there hath beene in tymes past, Wherfor it wold pleas your moost noble grace if the case require that your said enymes approche unto the same, to provide and ordane that your true citicyns therof may be conveniently assisted and releved at youre proper costes and charges, whreby we trust God to withstond your said ennemyes and kepe this youre said citie unto your soverain lord, And where also your said citie is not well furnesshed with artilment and stuff of ordnaunce for the more diffence of the same as it hath beene heretofore soo it heth beene charhed of lait in that behalve, we besuche your moste noble grace that some of youre ordnaunce and artilment of werr might be sent hidder to the same entent, which were a thing unto us of grete comfort and make us encouraged the more largely tp withstand your ennemyes. Further to the berer heroe John Vavasour, your servant at the lawe and our Recordour, we besuch your most noble grace to geve credence in such things as shall shewe unto the same upon our behalve concerning the premissez. And the Blissed Trinitee preserve you most highe and mighty christen prince and our moost redoubtid soverain lige lors evere in felicitee. From your said Citie the xxiiij day of April the secunde yere of youre moost gracious reigne.

Your most humble subgiettes and true Liegemen
the Maier Aldremen Shereffes and Comune
Counsail of your Citie of York."

No sooner had the messenger departed with this letter than the city authorities received a royal missive, dated April 20th, requesting them "kepe due watch and warde for the suretie" of the city "as well as by day as by night." The council immediately appointed proper persons to be wardsne of each of the six wards, which the city was then divided, viz., "Walmgate, Monkebarr, Bowtham, Castlegate, Mickillyth, and the postern of Northstreet." During the time the city as being guarded, Alderman William Wells, an ex-Lord Mayor, acting as warden or captain of the watch at Bootham Bar, was assassinated by a treachourous and disloyal citizen. News of the dastardly affaie was forwarded to the King on the 14th May, which is referred to in the following manner: - We have kept due watche and warde for the surty of your said citie as well by day as by night, and from tyme to tyme and so we shall continue unto we have otherwise in comaundment from your said grace; And where soverain lord, oure welbeloved brother William Wells late mayre of this your said citie and alderman of the same, being at your said watche as wardan and ruler thereof, to oure

grete hevyness and discomfort was stricken to death by oone John Robson milner and citicyn of our said citie, whom we have in sure ward to be inquired of according to your laws and punysshed after his demeritez in example of all other.”

The rebellious malcontent, gaining no sympathy in York, marched southwards, and were effectually crushed at Stoke, near Newark; and Symnell, the pretender fell into Henry’s hands. His majesty soon afterwards visited York, and to show his appreciation of the loyalty displayed by the citizens and their civic leaders, knighted William Todd, the Lord Mayor, and Richard York, an opulent merchant and alderman of the city.

In 1489 a riotous mob, incited by their seditious leader, John Chambers, assaulted the city and damaged the fortifications at Fishergate Bar. Henry (VII), being cognisant of the injury done to the walls in this revolt, was probably reminded of it when he addresses the following letter to John Ferriby, Lord Mayor, in 1491, charging him and his brother aldermen to repair the fortifications and cleanse the protecting ditch that surrounded the city.



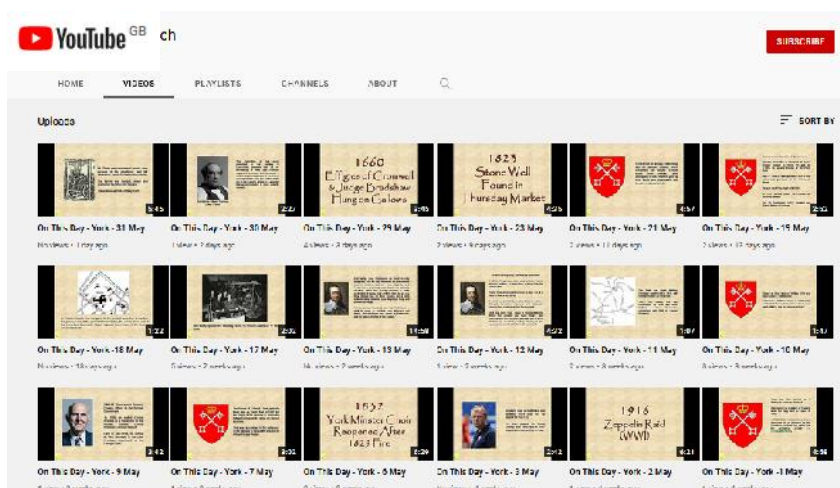

Trusty and welbeloved we grete you well and forasmuche as we calle to our remembraunce thout our citie ther for lake of sufficient ordenances and habilyments of were fortifying and repairing of your walles and clensyng of your dykes was late lightly invaded to ye great danger therof and of or true subjects and inhabitants within the same We fully entending our seid citie to be kept and preserved from all suche peril hereafter woll and comaunde you to see all convenient hast yor walles to ne suffidantly amended yor dikes caste and clensed and suche competent habiliments of were harness gonnes and gonpoudre as shal be thought metely amd convenient for the suertie and defens of or seid citie And that this be dom wt al celerite and diligence as ye entende to please us and as noo default be arracted unto you if any inconvenient happen herafte, Geven und our signet at or palors of Westmr the iijth day of Marche.

To our trusty and welbeloved the Maire Aldermen
Comune Counsaill of our Citie of York.”

BBC Television Service Officially Launched

During October there have been various programmes celebrating the BBC's 100th anniversary.

On 18 October 1922 the British Broadcasting Company Ltd was formed by British and American electrical companies doing business in the United Kingdom. They were licensed by the British General Post Office, their original office was located on the second floor of Magnet House, the General Electric Company buildings in London. On 14 December 1922, John Reith was hired to become the Managing Director.

The company later moved to the premises of the Marconi Company.

In these early years the BBC was a commercial broadcasting company and did not sell air time but did carry a number of sponsored programmes paid for by British newspapers, and of course this was all on the wireless (radio).

On 31 December 1926, the company was dissolved, and its assets were transferred to the non-commercial and crown-chartered British Broadcasting Corporation.

Ten years later on 2 November 1936 the BBC television service was officially launched from Alexandra Palace, there had been experimental television broadcasts since 1929, and limited regular broadcasts from 1934.

Although very few people would have had a television in their homes, and those who did, it was only a small screen, in black and white and not the best quality picture. At first people would either find the neighbour who could afford a set or watch outside the local television shop.

The first day's broadcast began at 3pm, closed at 4pm, then re-opened at 9pm and closed at 10pm. The schedule was:

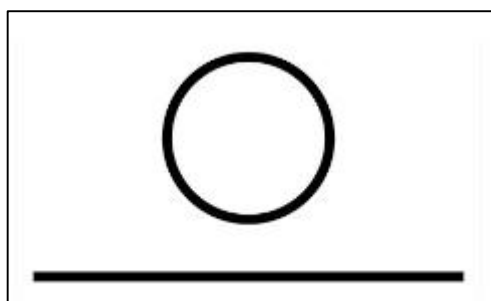
3pm	Opening of the BBC Television Service By Major the Right Hon George Tryon MP, HM Postmaster-General. Ronald Norman (Chairman of the BBC) and the Right Hon the Lord Selsdon, KBE (Chairman of the Television Advisory Committee) also spoke.

3.20pm	British Movietone News
3.30pm	Variety 'Adele Dixon - Musical Comedy Star Buck and Bubbles - Comedians and Dancers The Lai Founs - Chinese Jugglers The BBC Television Orchestra - Leader: Boris Pecker; Conductor: Hyam Greenbaum Adele Dixon is now playing lead opposite Laddie Cliff in the West End musical comedy "Over She Goes". Amongst recent radio shows she has played in are "Lots of Love" and "Cottage Loaf". Buck and Bubbles are a coloured pair who are now playing in "Transatlantic Rhythm". They are versatile comedians who dance, play the piano, sing, and cross-chat. 9.05pm	Television Comes to London A BBC Film. ‘In this film, specially taken for the BBC, viewers are given an idea of the growth of the television installation at Alexandra Palace and an insight into production routine. There will be many shots behind the scenes. One sequence, for instance, will show Adele Dixon as she appears to viewers in the Variety at 3.30 this afternoon, and will then reveal the technical staff and equipment in the studio that made this transmission possible.’ <i>From Radio Times</i>
9.20pm	Picture Page ‘A Magazine of Topical and General Interest. This is the first of a series in which people of interest will be introduced. In the recent test transmissions, Squadron-Leader Swain, who broke the aeroplane altitude record, was one of the subjects. In every way the technique is novel. For instance, Joan Miller, who links the show introduces each person by plugging in a telephone switchboard after a few preliminary words of description. She is a young Canadian actress who was recently leading lady at the Clemenceau play "The Tiger", and last December she played in the radio version of "On the Spot". Archbishops of York – Wigmund, Wulfhere, Æthelbald & Hrotheward

Again little appears to be known about Wigmund. He was appointed Archbishop of York in 837 and his term ended with his death in 854.

Hrotheward:
Born: ?
Died: 931
Appointed: 904 - 928
Term Ended: 931
Predecessor: Æthelbald
Successor: Wulstan

It is also known that he produced his own coins which were minted by a number of moneyers, including Aethelward, Hunlaf and Coenred

Following the death of Wigmund, Wulfhere was appointed Archbishop of York and again had his own coins produced, his moneyers included Wulfred and Eardwulf

In 866 York was captured by the Viking army. The Anglo-Saxons failed to recapture the city the following year.

It seems, however, Wulfhere was able to make peace with the Vikings by 868 and he was able to stay in York.

Four years later, in 872 the Northumbrians rebelled against the Vikings and their collaborators, at which time Wulfhere fled and found refuge with Burgred, King of Mercia.

In 873 he was recalled to York where he stayed until his death in either 892 or 900. If his death was in 892, then the See of York was vacant for eight years until Æthelbald was appointed in 900.

Again only the bare facts about Æthelbald and his successor.

Æthelbald died between 904 and 928 Hrotheward (or Lodeward) was appointed sometime between those years and his term ended with his death in 931.

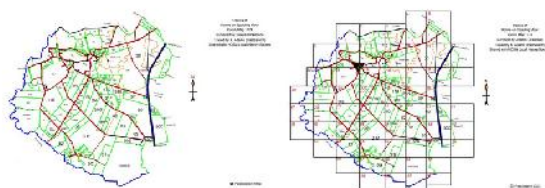

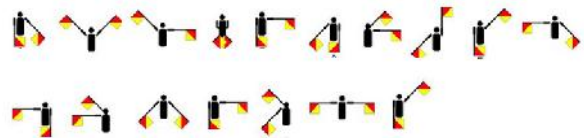
